

What's Next: Overall Landscaping Schedule

Landscaping will take place as separate projects after the major construction is done. Schedule as follows:

• Section 6: Spring 2022

Section 7A: Fall 2022

Section 7B: Fall 2022


• Section 8: Late 2023

• Ensuring landscaping quality and viability: FDOT requires contractors maintain plants during a two-year warranty period after final installation

• Long-term maintenance: FDOT asset management contract includes mowing, litter and weed control


Roundabout Aesthetics – Community Engagement

FDOT received community feedback regarding the roundabout aesthetics and the impact on wildlife.

Listening sessions: FDOT embarked on a listening tour

- Reached out to 50 key stakeholders on Sections 6 & 7A
- Conducted 16 listening sessions virtual and in person
- Goals:
 - Share project information and constraints
 - Receive input to help enhance the roundabout aesthetics plan

The department committed to listening to public concerns and meeting the community's vision for the area.

Common Themes


- Look natural
- Stable, less susceptible to erosion/washout
- Easily traversable by wildlife
- Native to area
- Least costly concern for taxpayer dollars


- Readily / easily available
- Durable
- Lowest / easiest maintenance (less labor intensive)
- No to impervious surfaces want to promote aquifer recharge
- Be mindful of calcium and pH balance effect of materials


